September		<p><u>The Legend of Rock Paper Scissors</u></p> <p>From acclaimed, bestselling creators Drew Daywalt, author of <i>The Day the Crayons Quit</i> and <i>The Day the Crayons Came Home</i>, and Adam Rex, author-illustrator of <i>Frankenstein Makes a Sandwich</i>, comes a laugh-out-loud hilarious picture book about the epic tale of the classic game Rock, Paper, Scissors.</p>

December		<p><u>The Book with No Pictures</u></p> <p>You might think a book with no pictures seems boring and serious. Except . . . here's how books work. Everything written on the page <i>has</i> to be said by the person reading it aloud. Even if the words say...BLORK. Or BLUURF. Even if the words are a preposterous song about eating ants for breakfast, or just a list of astonishingly goofy sounds like BLAGGITY BLAGGITY and GLIBBITY GLOBBITY. Cleverly irreverent and irresistibly silly, <i>The Book with No Pictures</i> is one that kids will beg to hear again and again. (And parents will be happy to oblige.)</p>	
January		<p><u>Ada Twist, Scientist</u></p> <p>Like her classmates, builder Iggy and inventor Rosie, scientist Ada, a character of color, has a boundless imagination and has always been hopelessly curious. Why are there pointy things stuck to a rose? Why are there hairs growing inside your nose? When her house fills with a horrific, toe-curling smell, Ada knows it's up to her to find the source. What would you do with a problem like this? Not afraid of failure, Ada embarks on a fact-finding mission and conducts scientific experiments, all in the name of discovery. But, this time, her experiments lead to even more stink and get her into trouble!</p>

<p>Read Across America Week</p>		<p><u>The Cat in the Hat</u> Join the Cat in the Hat as he makes learning to read a joy! It's a rainy day and Dick and Sally can't find anything to do . . . until the Cat in the Hat unexpectedly appears and turns their dreary afternoon into a fun-filled extravaganza! This beloved Beginner Book by Dr. Seuss, which also features timeless Dr. Seuss characters such as Fish and Thing 1 and Thing 2, is fun to read aloud and easy to read alone. Written using 236 different words that any first or second grader can read, it's a fixture in home and school libraries and a favorite among parents, beginning readers, teachers, and librarians.</p>	
<p>March</p>		<p><u>Strictly No Elephants</u> When the local Pet Club won't admit a boy's tiny pet elephant, he finds a solution—one that involves all kinds of unusual animals in this sweet and adorable picture book. Today is Pet Club day. There will be cats and dogs and fish, but <i>strictly no elephants</i> are allowed. The Pet Club doesn't understand that pets come in all shapes and sizes, just like friends. Now it is time for a boy and his tiny pet elephant to show them what it means to be a true friend. Imaginative and lyrical, this sweet story captures the magic of friendship and the joy of having a pet.</p>	
<p>April</p>		<p><u>It's Not Jack and the Beanstalk</u> Jack is not fond of the bossy narrator of his fairy tale! When Jack is told to trade his beloved cow Bessie for some magic beans, throw the beans out the window, climb the ENORMOUS beanstalk that sprouts overnight, and steal from a GIANT, he decides this fairy tale is getting out of control. In fact, he doesn't want to follow the story line at all. Who says Jack needs to enter a life of daring, thievery, and giant trickery? He takes his story into his own hands—and you'll never guess what happens next! With laugh-out-loud dialogue and bold, playful art (including hidden fairy tale creatures for kids to find), this <i>Jack and the Beanstalk</i> retelling will have children rolling with laughter till Bessie the cow comes home.</p>
